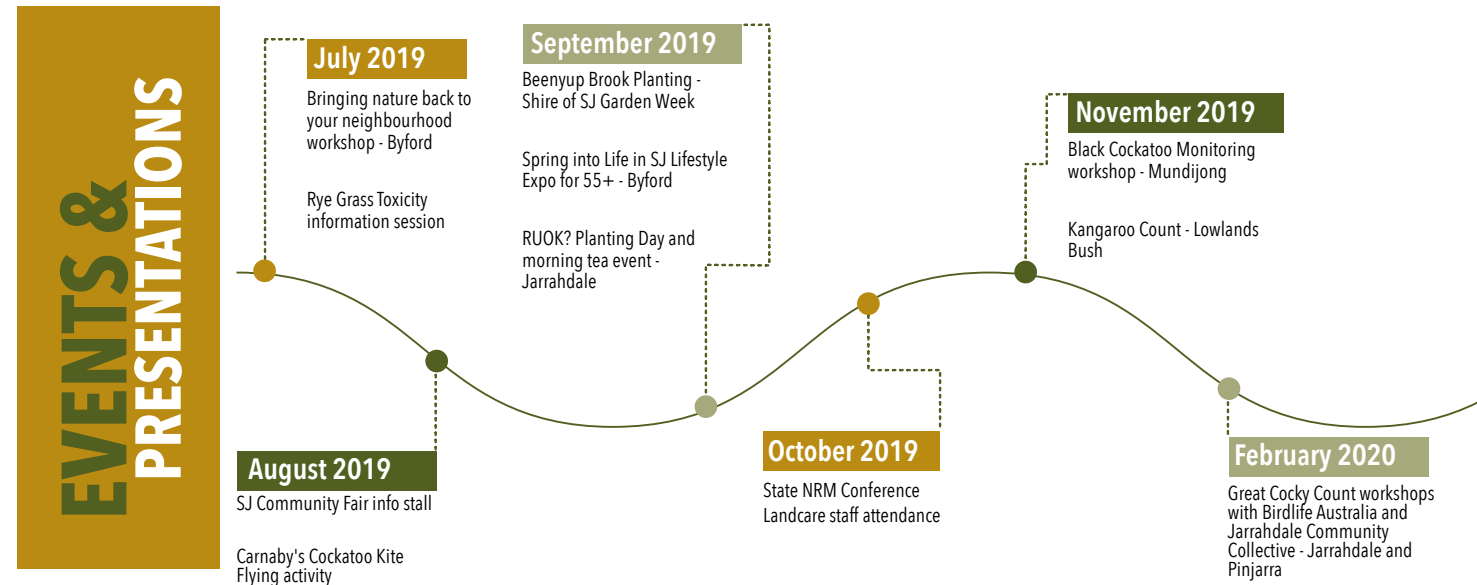

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Landcare SJ continues to work towards achieving the aims of our Business and Strategic plans in delivering projects and activities which meet our required outcomes. These include where we work in partnership with the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale - the Healthy Habitats Biodiversity Stewardship Program, delivery of the Free Verge Plant Program and supporting other Shire of SJ environmental programs including Urban and Rural verges review, the significant tree program and restoration and enhancement of Shire reserves.

Despite the Covid-19 'slowdown' we were still able to conduct a number of events and workshops during 2019-20 including an information stall at the Shire SJ Senior's expo, a Carnaby's kite flying activity at 2019 SJ Community Fair, Bringing Nature to your Backyard with celebrity presenter Faye Arcaro and an Annual Rye Grass Toxicity info session.

Great Cocky Count events in Jarrahdale and Pinjarra, Black Cockatoo hollow monitoring with Birdlife WA in Mundijong, several kangaroo surveys and a planting day at Lowlands with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) are examples of the mature partnerships that Landcare SJ has forged with government and non-government agencies.

Coupled with our planting calendar in SJ where 65,196 seedlings were planted - including our National Tree Day, Schools Tree Day and R U OK? Planting day and morning tea, Landcare SJ were able to engage the community across a range of subjects and activities.

Coordinating and supporting environmental community groups to continue and further their work across different localities in the Shire is a feature of the Landcare SJ calendar. Groups have volunteered for community plantings, Shire reserves maintenance, roadside rubbish collection, watering seedlings, weeding and the like, with groups taking pride in their achievements and outcomes.

Landcare SJ's pool of nearly 800 volunteers confirms the high regard and reputation that the organisation has within the Peel regional community. However it is the quality of volunteer that Landcare SJ attracts and the skills, innovation, reliability and networks that they contribute that adds so much value to the quality of Landcare SJ projects. Landcare SJ is now recognised for the quality assurance of its goods and services.

Externally funded projects included the Banksia Woodland Project, Getting Rid of Water Hyacinth on the Serpentine River, Monitoring and Maintenance of Cockatube artificial Hollows in SJ, Feral animal control in Shire Reserves and along River Road hit project delivery targets related to protection and restoration of waterways, protecting biodiversity in Shire Reserves, Biosecurity control and WA Black Cockatoo recovery.

Fee for service projects included mine site revegetation (Doral), protecting Threatened Ecological Communities along the rail corridor (Arc Infrastructure) delivery of Landcare Services (Shires of Murray), river restoration planning (Peel-Harvey Catchment Council), and Cockatube installation and monitoring (various). These projects assist in protecting and enhancing biodiversity in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale and beyond, while allowing Landcare SJ to generate additional income to meet our operating and administrative expenses.

The Cockatube project continues to provide additional income from sales, but possum and phascogale nestboxes have also proven popular over the past 12 months.

Landcare SJ appreciates the ongoing support and funding from the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale in helping to achieve mutual environmental and natural resource management goals by assisting Landcare SJ to provide the means for the community to care for the land today, in a way that will leave it better for tomorrow.

I would like to thank the members of the Board and Management committees for their continuing endeavours to fulfill the Landcare Vision.

Finally a special thank you to our amazing staff who from March to June managed to keep Landcare SJ operational by adapting each working day to the extraordinary demands of a global pandemic.

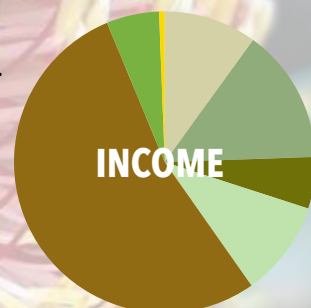

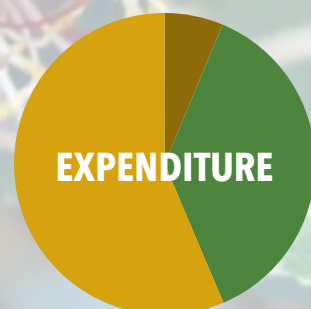
